

Just before Easter, **we invested £1000 in our reading scheme**, to continue to maintain a scheme of high quality fiction and non-fiction banded books. **Regular reading as often as possible is the key to success, so please read with and to your child whenever you can.** Your child may bring home a reading card from time to time (e.g. when they change book band levels) with suggested questions and activities to help you develop their skills as you read with them. There are also more ideas for sharing books and developing reading on our school website. Please do not hesitate to get in touch with the class teacher, or with Mrs Crutchley, if you would like any further advice on reading with your child.





This month Cressida Cowell, who is the current Children's Laureate, wrote to the government asking for an annual £100 million to be made available for school libraries. She highlights the fact that provision of good school libraries is 'about children's life chances'. **We are really proud of our library at Brockwell**. It is a bright, vibrant space that the children love visiting. Year 3 and 4 children visit weekly with their teacher to browse, chat about reading, and change their books. Year 5 and 6 children are invited to visit independently when they wish to select a book. The library has a regularly updated fiction section, and a non-fiction section with many books related to our Learning Challenge questions. We have comics and weekly news magazines too – there really is something for everyone! **Please do use your children's library choice as another opportunity to read with them and chat about their reading.**
