Modern Foreign Languages Policy SEPTEMBER 2020



INTRODUCTION

As part of the Primary National Curriculum learning a foreign language is a requirement for children within KS2. At Brockwell Junior School French is taught by teachers or staff in our school. Children generally experience 30minutes of languages and cultural learning every week, sometimes blocked or including a longer, special experience. Classroom displays and displays around school have supported this learning, as have annual visits from Foreign Language Students.

<u>AIMS</u>

We want children to be curious about other cultures and understand some people have different languages. Through French, we want them to enjoy and succeed in communicating using another language, both spoken and written.

We aim to:

- develop children's experience of language acquisition and encourage curiosity about languages
- develop their understanding of what they hear and read, and have an ability to express themselves in speech and writing
- extend their knowledge of how language works and explore differences between French and English
- strengthen their sense of identity through learning about French culture and comparing it with their own culture.

TEACHING AND LEARNING OVERVIEW

Teaching is in line with the recommendations of the National Curriculum and The Primary Framework for Languages, with modifications in place which allow for the individual and differentiated needs of the children. It takes full account of the different experiences, strengths and interests of the children whilst also complying with the requirements and guidance on inclusion.

The national curriculum for languages aims to ensure that all pupils:

- understand and respond to spoken and written language from a variety of authentic sources
- speak with increasing confidence, fluency and spontaneity, finding ways of communicating what they want to say, including through discussion and asking questions, and continually improving the accuracy of their pronunciation and intonation
- can write at varying length, for different purposes and audiences, using the variety of grammatical structures that they have learnt
- can discover an
- develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied.

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ORGANISATION

French is taught in a whole-class setting, by classroom teachers. Lessons are sequenced through topic based units. Clear links are made to the key strands of Oracy, Literacy and Intercultural Understanding and objectives relating to 'Knowledge about Language' and 'Language Learning Strategies' are also detailed.

POURQUOI LA FRANCAIS?

- 200 million people speak French around the world, and it is an official language in 32 countries.
- French travelled around the world as a colonial language and played a key part in the founding of the United Nations, the Olympic movement and the European Common Market, hence its status, alongside English, as the language of diplomacy.
- The British Council recognises the long-held attachment the British have felt to the language.
- It forms an aspect of our past. For nearly 400 years when the country was ruled by Norman kings, it was the language of the ruling class of the time the nobility spoke French, like everyone at the royal palaces and in the judiciary. Many aspects of French culture have become world-renowned and famous i.e. impressionist painters and architecture
- By introducing children to the language and some of the basic aspects during the Junior years the uptake in KS3 and 4 may increase.

Teaching ideas are strongly rooted in 'LCP', TWINKL Plan IT, and 'Early Start French'. The lessons are designed to motivate children from the first moment and are mainly practical in focus. They have clear, achievable objectives and incorporate different learning styles. Children with SEN have access to the curriculum through variation of task, grouping or support from an adult. Each class typically has a timetabled lesson of 30 minutes per week.

French lessons provide a variety of sources to model the language, use games and songs to maximize enjoyment and make as many connections to real life situations as possible. Lessons focus on speaking and listening. However, when appropriate, children record written work informally in books which are passed through the years and become a portfolio of their learning.

Below is an outline of the themes within this KS2 phase.


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

RESOURCES

Twinkl Plan It is saved centrally with lessons carefully sequenced incorporating all aspects of primary languages. LCP Primary languages and Early Start 1 (for Y3+4) and 2 (for Y5+6) are kept in a central store and accessible through the network electronically. Singing French, Mon Ane and numerous other resources are available.



A library of resources has been compiled and is located on the school server in 'Primary Languages' folders. This includes access to flash cards, activity sheets, songs and slides with language examples.



Students from France or Spain join us annually through the Brookfield Community School Partnership. This results in opportunities to learn about another part of the world and listen / respond.

Classes are encouraged to incorporate a languages song from the Singing Bank into their class assembly performances.

Some sessions include food tasting and content

relevant to current news stories of the times.

ASSESSMENT AND RECORD KEEPING

Informal assessment of progress is made by the language provider during lessons through responses to activities, questioning and oral feedback. Early Start self-assessment sheets are available completed by the children if required and reviewed by the Subject Leader. Summative assessment is

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available on the school assessment tracker and is reported to parents annually.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The MFL Subject leader monitors the planning and the delivery of French on a termly basis. Findings are shared with the SLT. This includes drop ins, discussions, questionnaire responses and pupil workbooks.

A new scheme of work is being evaluated during 2021 to 2022 after which the policy will be updated to reflect any changes.
