Rome – capital of Italy on the Tiber & ancient capital of the Empire. Empire - an extensive group of states or countries ruled over by a single monarch, an oligarchy, or a sovereign state

Emperor – Ruler of the Roman Empire **Legion** – a division of thousands of soldiers in the army.


Barbarian – someone not belonging to the Empire

Villa – large, country Roman house Amphitheatre – open oval or circular building for drama or sports.

Pantheon – Roman temple dedicated to gods of pagan Rome

Chariot – two-wheeled vehicle drawn by horses

Temple – building for worship **Bath** – building with rooms for socialising and bathing.


















Romans Fact-file

A very important ancient civilisation, the arrival of Romans dramatically changed the way people lived and is still seen today (public baths, libraries, street stalls, aqueducts, glass, the calendar and sewers to name a few).

Julius Caesar attempted to invade Britain in 55-54 BC Emperor Claudius did so successfully in CE 43.

There were no roads in Britain before. They built 10,000 miles of roads such as the Fosse Way.

Emperor Hadrian ordered a wall be built between Roman Britain and Scotland (73 miles long!).

Like Chesterfield, towns were set up in a grid with a market square called the 'forum'. If a town has '-cester' or '-chester' in the name...it is Roman!

Latin, Roman language, was spoken in the towns.

Boudicca was the Queen of the Iceni tribe of modern day East Anglia. She led an important revolt against Rome.
